- View your covered benefits.
- View your copayments, coinsurance, and deductible.
- Find information about your pharmacy coverage, including:
 - A list of drugs in different cost tiers, including preferred drugs and drugs with medical restrictions
 - Limits or quotas
 - Brand name drugs that have generic substitutions
 - How to request an exception for a drug not usually covered
 - How to request pre-approval for a drug (only required for certain drugs)
 - Step therapy, which means trying safe, cost-effective medication options before more expensive drugs will be covered
 - Therapeutic interchange, which means an alternative drug may be substituted for the drug originally prescribed (with your doctor's approval)
